



Pop CLIL Lesson: "Need Your Love"

Pop CLIL Subject: Economics | **Secondary Focus:** Sociology | **Song Used:** "Need Your Love" by OneRepublic

Description

The Lesson in Action (Description): Students will act as socio-economic analysts investigating modern consumption habits. They will decode the anti-materialist message in the song, read a brief academic text on the "Degrowth Movement," extract key sociological vocabulary, and collaboratively draft an Ethical Accountability Statement as their final generative output.

The Song's Narrative (At a Glance): The artist explicitly rejects wealth, credit cards, and "expensive problems" in favor of authentic human connection. He realizes that chasing millions of dollars and mansions creates an illusion of success that distracts from what is truly real and lasting.

A Note on the BEAT+ Method: This lesson was crafted using the MUSIC+ Framework, a core component of the BEAT+ Method. POP CLIL is a new application of MUSIC+, extending its song-based learning system into academic content areas such as science, literature, and sociology. Objectives

- **Analyze** anti-consumerism and modern socio-economic priorities.
- **Employ** key sociological vocabulary to critique materialist culture.
- **Mediate** complex meanings by negotiating evidentiary data in a peer think-tank.
- **Generate** creative digital content that integrates target vocabulary into a modern socio-economic format.

Step-by-Step Instructions

Step 1 – Visual Hook – Motivation+ (5 min)

- First, display Slide 1, which shows a split-screen visual of a chaotic luxury mall versus a quiet, minimalist cabin.
- Ask the class: "Look at the screen. Describe the economic values driving the people in the first image versus the second image."

Then, facilitate a brief discussion by asking:

- "Which environment represents 'success' in 2026?"
- "Which environment represents 'peace'?"

Afterward, transition to the next part by saying: "Now, let's listen to an artist evaluating these exact two lifestyles."



Step 2 – The Contradiction Catch – Understanding+ (8 min)

- Next, move to Slide 2 and prepare to play the first verse and chorus of the song "Need Your Love."
- Tell the students: "Listen to the song. Does the singer want a mansion and unlimited credit cards, or is he searching for something else?"
- Play the audio twice, then ask: "Identify his attitude toward wealth."



- Once they have shared their thoughts, bridge to the reading by saying: "He is clearly rejecting modern consumerism. Let's read a short text to translate his feelings into professional sociological terms."

Step 3 – The Sociological Reading – Skills+ (8 min)

- Now, hand out the Student Worksheet, but be sure to keep the lyrics sheets for later.
- Display Slide 3, which features the "Economic Board" with four key terms: Hyper-consumerism, Wealth Illusion, Status Anxiety, and Regenerative Living.
- Instruct the class: "Read the short text in Part 1 of your worksheet about the modern 'Degrowth' movement."
- Then, have them follow the instructions to extract the professional vocabulary needed for today's analysis.
- After they finish, say: "Now that we have our sociological vocabulary, let's hunt for evidence of these concepts in the artist's own words."



Step 4 – Sociological Translation – Skills+ (10 min)

- At this point, hand out the full lyrics sheet so students can self-correct their previous auditory notes.
- Show Slide 4 and play the specific song segment from "Don't need the buzz" to "expensive problems."
- Tell the students: "Listen to this short segment of the song again. The analyst notes in Part 2 of your worksheet contain factual errors about the singer's desires."
- Direct them to cross out the incorrect everyday phrases and replace them with the correct sociological terms from the board.
- Finally, bridge to the next step by saying: "You have extracted the sociological data. Let's quickly lock in our definitions before we begin our policy meeting."

Step 5 – The Semantic Check – Skills+ (4 min)

- Display Slide 5, which shows a clean matching graphic for the key terms.
 - Ask the students to look at Part 3 of their worksheet.
 - Say: "Take two minutes to match the academic terms to their correct meanings so we are all using the same professional language."
 - Once they are finished, move to the group activity by saying: "Our vocabulary is secure. Now, you must act as a team of analysts to build a socio-economic profile."
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Step 6 – The Think-Tank – Interaction+ (10 min)

- Show Slide 6 and organize the students into their analytical groups.
- Explain their mission: “Analyze the lyric, 'Most people searching for something real.' Is society currently driven by the behavior of Hyper-consumerism or the belief of a Wealth Illusion?”
- Instruct them to use the academic phrases from the board to debate and build their profile together.

Ask the groups to consider:

- “Does the singer suggest a form of Regenerative Living?”
- “How can you justify your profile using evidence from the lyrics?”

After the discussion, say: “The think-tank meeting is over. It is time to submit your final sociological proposals.”

Step 7 – The Final Project – Creativity+ (15 min)

- Finally, display Slide 7 and present the three output options.
- Tell the class: “You have exactly 3 minutes to choose your output format from Part 5, and exactly 12 minutes to write your 4 sentences.”
- Remind them that their output must include at least two sociological phrases from the board.

For their creative response, let students choose **one** of the following options:

- **Path 1:** The Degrowth Manifesto
- **Path 2:** The Anti-Consumerism Campaign
- **Path 3:** The Ethical Corporate Email

As they work, encourage those who finish early to improve one sentence by adding more detail.

To conclude the lesson, say: “Excellent work finalizing your socio-economic proposals today.”

Optional Homework – Creativity+

For homework, assign the **Extended Portfolio** project.

Instruct students to: “Expand your chosen project from Step 7 into a full-page proposal or campaign draft. Ensure you use all four sociological terms discussed in class to justify your ideas.”

APPENDIX B: THE TEACHER'S ANSWER KEY

Target Vocabulary Extraction Blueprint (Board Work):

1. Hyper-consumerism
2. Wealth Illusion
3. Status Anxiety
4. Regenerative Living

Part 1 Cognitive Key (Underlined Ideas):

(Note: Students should underline these exact phrases immediately preceding or following the bolded terms).

- hyper-consumerism --> *the constant desire to buy new things*
- wealth illusion --> *falsely believing that having millions of dollars and expensive items equals true happiness*
- status anxiety --> *trying to maintain this luxury image to impress others*
- regenerative living --> *a lifestyle focused on sustainability, authentic human connection, and true mental well-being*

Part 2 Anti-Extraction Trap (Error Correction Answers):

1. extreme shopping --> **Hyper-consumerism**
2. a fake sense of success --> **Wealth Illusion**
3. the stress of trying to look rich --> **Status Anxiety**
