



Lyrical Reading: Vision (Matt Hansen) A BEAT+ MUSIC+ Experience - Instructions pdf

Description

The Lesson in Action (Description): This lesson turns the emotional concept of resilience into a high-energy investigation. Moving away from passive listening, advanced students act as detectives, watching a digital avatar deliver a dramatic monologue to capture raw visual and auditory data. They will collaboratively deduce its meaning, actively extract targeted B2+ idioms, and use Imperatives of Resilience to debate the narrative and generate a personalized survival manifesto.

The Song's Narrative (At a Glance): Matt Hansen's "VISION" explores the painful but necessary process of overcoming anxiety and heartbreak. The singer grapples with feeling stranded and overwhelmed, ultimately concluding that deep emotional wounds often provide the clarity and strength needed to survive and move forward.

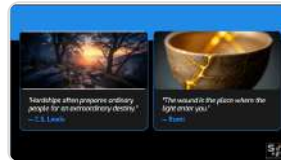
Step-by-Step Instructions

Step 1 – The Principle Hook – Motivation+ (7 min)

Goal: Activate schema and establish the thematic concept of surviving hardship and finding clarity.

Text on Screen: Quote 1: "Hardships often prepares ordinary people for an extraordinary destiny." — C.S. Lewis | Quote 2: "The wound is the place where the light enter you." — Rumi

Teacher Script: "Look closely at the board. Each of these famous quotes has one grammatical error. Hunt for the mistakes and call them out when you find them! (Elicit: ['prepare' and 'enters']). Excellent. Now, which of these two quotes do you personally agree with more, and why?"



Transition: "Let's see which of these two quotes matches the message a certain person needs to hear today."

Step 2 – The Monologue Data Sprint – Understanding+ (5 min)

Goal: Capture raw auditory and visual data to build top-down comprehension and decode paralinguistic cues.

Text on Screen: The Mission: Watch the face. Catch the words.

Teacher Script: "Keep your eyes on the screen. I am going to play a video of someone delivering a message. The stream will move fast. Your mission is to watch their expressions and capture



as much raw data as humanly possible. **Take notes** on interesting ideas, words, or emotions you see and hear. You **MUST** write something down, even if it is just single, disconnected words."

Transition: "You have your raw visual and auditory fragments. Now let's reconstruct the puzzle."

Step 3 – The Narrative Reconstruction & Lyric Reveal – Understanding+ (7 min)

Goal: Negotiate meaning collaboratively and synthesize auditory fragments into a coherent message.

Text on Screen: The Goal: Reconstruct the message. Which quote from Step 1 does it match? (Lewis: Hardships prepare you. / Rumi: The wound lets the light in.)

Teacher Script: "Get into your pairs. Put your messy notes together. Your task is to look at the fragments of words and ideas you both caught and negotiate the meaning. Reconstruct the story, come up with a conclusion about the song's primary message, and decide which of the two quotes from the board best applies to it. You have 5 minutes."

Transition: "Time is up! Before we hear your final verdicts, I am handing out the official lyrics sheet. Take two minutes to compare your notes. Did you catch the right words?"



Step 4 – The Room Consensus & Video Check – Understanding+ (10 min)

Goal: Verify acoustic predictions against visual context and the official text.

Text on Screen: What is the genre? Does the video match your prediction?

Teacher Script: "Let's hear your verdicts. Now that you have seen the real lyrics, what kind of song do you think this is? Fast or slow? What genre? (Elicit: [Pop/Emotional/Anthem]). Let's find out. **Watch the video** and check if your predictions were right."

Transition: "Now that we have the full picture, let's extract the exact tools we need to give this singer some advice."

Step 5 – The Excerpt Decoder & Syntactic Tools – Skills+ (10 min)

Goal: Decode target idioms from context and introduce Imperatives as functional resilience tools.

Text on Screen: "Sometimes, what breaks your heart will clear your vision" | What does "clear your vision" mean? A) Fix your eyesight. B) Give you true perspective. C) Make you forget the past. | Survival Tools (Imperatives): Hold on / Keep on / Don't let

Teacher Script: "Look closely at the lyrics on the board. The singer uses a specific, high-level English phrase: 'clear your vision'. **Read the options and decide** what this phrase actually means. (Elicit: [Option B]). Excellent. Now, to help someone survive this pain, we need to give direct orders. What grammar tools do we use? Imperatives! Words like Hold on, Keep on, and Don't let. **Remember, we are giving direct orders today. Drop the subject! Don't say 'You should hold on,' just say 'Hold on!'** You are going to use these Imperatives combined with our new phrase to defend your opinions today."

Transition: "You have your evidence and your linguistic armor. It is time to use them."

Step 6 – The Critical Lens Debate – Interaction+ (10 min)

Goal: Mediate the song's emotional tone using target idioms and syntactic peer accountability.

Text on Screen: Is this a song about defeat or empowerment? (You **MUST** use the phrase "clear your vision" in your debate!)

Teacher Script: "Look at the singer's face in the video. What is he feeling right now? (Elicit: [Anxious / Overwhelmed / Determined]). Back in your pairs or trios, you must debate this: ultimately, do you think this song is about giving up or becoming stronger? **Use your assigned roles** on your handout to manage the conversation. To defend your answer and prove your fluency, you **MUST** use our target phrase 'clear your vision' AND an

Imperative while you negotiate."

Transition: "Fantastic arguments. Now let's turn that resilience into permanent action."

Step 7 – The Thematic Project – Creativity+ (9 min)

Goal: Generate creative digital content combining target syntax and lexis.

Text on Screen: Choose your mission! The Rule: You MUST combine an Imperative of Resilience (Hold/Keep/Don't) AND the phrase "clear your vision". | Option A (The Text Message): Write a 3-line text giving the singer tough love. | Option B (The Inner Monologue): Write the exact script the singer says to himself in the mirror. | Option C (The Survival Manifesto): Write 4 personal rules on how to survive a bad week. | Extended Portfolio (Homework Mission): Write a 250-word advice column for a digital magazine. A reader wrote in saying they feel "stranded in the trenches." You MUST use at least three Imperatives of Resilience AND the phrase "clear your vision" to structure your response.

Teacher Script: "Turn to the final part of your handout. You have three choices to complete your mission today. However, to prove your mastery, you must combine your language: you MUST use an Imperative AND authentically use our target phrase. For example, 'Don't let the anxiety win, because this pain will clear your vision.' You have 9 minutes to create."

Transition: "Please stop writing and put your pens down."

Step 8 – The Power of the Pause – Motivation+ (2 min)

Goal: Metacognitive reflection with zero spoken output.

Text on Screen: Which sentence are you most proud of writing today?

Teacher Script: "For the next two minutes, there is zero talking. Read the project you just created. Circle the one sentence that makes you feel the most proud of your English today."

Transition: "Thank you for your hard work today."

ANSWER KEY

PART 1: THE PRINCIPLE HOOK (Error Correction)

Quote 1: "prepares" → **prepare**. (Explanation: The subject is "Hardships" (plural), which takes the base verb form).

Quote 2: "enter" → **enters**. (Explanation: The subject is "the light" (singular/uncountable), which takes the 's' ending in the present simple).

PART 2: THE MONOLOGUE DATA SPRINT (Acceptable Evidence)

Listen and look for these specific chunks/expressions: restless, hands shaking, racing, roof, world moved on, stranded in the trenches, losing hope, still standing, breaks your heart, clear your vision, leave a scar, forgivin', pull you under.

PART 3: THE EXCERPT DECODER

Correct Answer: **[X] B** Give you true perspective and emotional clarity after a difficult time.

PART 5: THE THEMATIC PROJECT & EXTENDED PORTFOLIO (The C-Rule Lock)

The Teacher Check: As you review their in-class creative work or their homework portfolio, you are looking for ONE critical combination. Did they correctly combine an **Imperative of Resilience** with the phrase "**clear your vision**"? (Acceptable Example: "**Don't let** the anxiety stop you, because this pain will **clear your vision**.") If both the syntactic and lexical constraints are met, they have successfully mastered the target language!
